



The Pennsylvania Avenue Baptist Church is the District's first faith-based vaccination partner.




This week, as part of a pilot, the church will host two vaccination clinics for 200 pre-registered residents.

CONTINUED ASSISTANCE ACT

The Continued Assistance Act (CAA), which was signed into law on December 27, 2020, extends many provisions of the CARES Act, including:

- Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC)
- Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA)
- Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC)

The CAA also adds a new benefit program:

the Mixed Earners Unemployment Compensation (MEUC) program.

UPDATES TO THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE SYSTEM

In preparing the District's Unemployment Insurance system to process the extended CARES Act benefits and new programs provided under the Continued Assistance Act, mandatory updates are necessary.

PROGRAM	SYSTEM STATUS
Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC)	Update was implemented and individuals started receiving \$300 FPUC payment since week ending January 2, 2021.
Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA)	System updates will be completed for individuals to file their weekly certifications via DCnetworks after February 10, 2021.
Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC)	These system updates will be completed for impacted individuals to file their weekly certifications via DCnetworks after February 19, 2021.
Mixed Earners Unemployment Compensation (MEUC)	The application for MEUC will be ready February 15, 2021. MEUC payments will begin on February 19, 2021.

The Department of Employment Services is working to make it easier for workers and residents to get answers about unemployment benefits:




Introduced new technology and tools for efficiency

RENTAL ASSISTANCE

Housing Stabilization Grants

To date:

\$11.5 million to approximately 4,500 households

The District paid 80% to tenants' back rent from April and November 2020 with their housing provider forgiving the rest.

Over 2,700 households, or 60%, are located in Wards 7 and 8.



Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program

To date:

\$1.5 million to approximately 450 low-income households

The COVID-19 Housing Assistance Program (CHAP) provides rental assistance to low-income renters who are in arrears due to the impact of the COVID-19 public health emergency.

UPDATE: Starting immediately, housing providers may apply to CHAP on behalf of eligible tenants.

ASSISTANCE PAYING UTILITY BILLS

Multiple programs are available to assist residents with paying their utility bills.



The District Department of Energy & Environment (DOEE) assists income-eligible District households with heating and cooling energy costs through the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). Eligible households can receive energy bill assistance between \$250 and \$1,800 as a one-time regular energy assistance benefit. This benefit is based on household size, total household income, heating source, and type of dwelling.



Additionally, the Public Service Commission of the District of Columbia (DCPSC) requires Pepco, Washington Gas and Verizon to offer **Utility Discount Programs (UDP)** to residential customers. Those programs, as well as programs from the Office of the People's Counsel and DC Water, assist low-income District residents in reducing their utility bills.
