CRIME TRENDS

- Citywide violent crime is down 11%
- Homicides are down 30%
- Assault with a dangerous weapon is down 31%; fewer gunshot victims
- Property crime is down 12%



THE FINANCIAL STATE OF THE DISTRICT IS STRONG

- 27th consecutive clean audit
- 9th consecutive year with no material weaknesses
- 51 days cash on hand
- Robust pension and retiree health care funds
- Bond ratings remain strong



OUR RECOVERY INVESTMENTS ARE HAVING AN IMPACT

In 2023, the District:

- ✓ **Increased population** for the second year in a row
- ✓ Added 12,260 more jobs
- ✓ Had hotel occupancy and room revenue return to pre-pandemic levels
- ✓ Welcomed 2.8 million more visitors
- ✓ Opened:
- nearly 165,000 sq feet of retail space,
- more than 800,000 sq feet of **office** space,
- more than 2,200 residential units, 649 new **hotel** rooms,
- new 400,000 sq foot branch of Johns Hopkins University,
- new 31,800 sq foot Rubell Museum
- ✓ Has more than 1,400 units delivering from office to residential conversions by 2025

- \$2.1B over 6 years for school modernizations and expansions.
- \$5M for "My Afterschool DC," an online central hub for families to learn of afterschool opportunities.



- Increases the available Housing in Downtown abatement from \$6.8M to \$41M.
- **\$9.8M** to fund improvements at Farragut Square.



- \$115M to rehabilitate and modernize public housing units managed by DCHA.
- \$31M to fund the Housing Production Trust Fund at \$100M.



- \$2.1M to support civilianization efforts.
- \$1.2M to launch a new DC Paramedic School.



- \$900,000 to buy down \$90M of medical debt for approximately 90,000 residents.
- **\$24.4M** to provide increased Medicaid rates for services in the behavioral health sector.



TRANSPORTATION & ENVIRONMENT

- **\$550M** to redesign our most dangerous roads and expand the bike lane and trails network.
- \$114M to continue building bus-only lanes and other updates.



FY25 BUDGET DEVELOPMENT

DC's economy has shifted because of the pandemic. We must change how we move forward.

- Our annual revenues are only growing around \$50 million a year
- Pandemic stimulus funds have ended
- Robust revenue growth enjoyed before and after the pandemic is significantly slowing

- Our expenditures are growing more than \$900 million a year due to:
 - WMATA fiscal cliff
 - Increased support for schools
 - Higher construction costs
 - New collective bargaining and retirement costs

We do lots of really great work in DC. We must focus our limited resources on what will move us forward.

- Maintain and enhance core services that are the foundation of any local government
- Prioritize investments that impact the life and safety of DC residents, businesses and visitors
- Maximize resources for education, public safety and downtown

- Provide fiscal stability by resetting our spending to align with our long-term resources

HOUSING PRODUCTION

• \$31M to fund the Housing Production Trust Fund at \$100M.

HOMEBUYERS

• \$4M to increase available down payment assistance through HPAP.

- \$1M to expand Strong Families, Strong Futures.
- \$13M to support 600 families in Career Map.

NEW COMMUNITIES INITIATIVE

• \$139M for New Communities Initiative at Barry Farm, Park Morton, and Northwest One, including 735 new public housing replacement units.

• \$115M to rehabilitate and modernize public housing units managed by the DC Housing Authority.

 \$69M to unlock Fletcher Johnson, Poplar Point, and bring a full-service grocery to East Capitol Gateway.

• \$9.8M to fund improvements at Farragut Square.

STUDENT INVESTMENT

\$145M to support a 5.05% increase to the foundation of the UPSFF.

FACILITIES

• \$90M over six years for DCPS to preserve and maintain school facilities through small capital investments and \$34M over six years for DCPS to improve information technology systems and connectivity.

TEACHER SUPPORT

• \$116M to support raising the wages of teachers in both public and public charter schools.

AFTERSCHOOL

• \$5M to begin planning and implementing "My Afterschool DC," an online central hub for parents to access afterschool opportunities for their children within the District.

RECREATION

• \$5M to renovate splash pads across the District to help children and youth stay safe and have fun on summer days.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

• \$24.4M to provide increased Medicaid rates for services in the behavioral health sector, and \$1.7M to support housing case management services for clients.

HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION

• \$2.2M to support homeless prevention programming and outreach.

PERSONS LIVING WITH DISABILITIES

• \$744,600 to increase personal needs allowance for persons with disabilities.

OLDER ADULTS

• \$1.1M to increase the eligibility for the Safe at Home program, \$1.5M to support the Connector Card program, and \$241K to distribute tablet devices to older adults for improving wellness activities, telehealth, and socialization, and \$500k to provide free dental services for seniors.

DC PARAMEDIC SCHOOL

• \$1.2M to launch a new DC Paramedic School.

FIRE AND EMERGENCY

\$29M in FY 2024 to replace Fire and EMS emergency response vehicles, including
ambulances and ladder trucks, as well as \$1.2M and 2 dedicated personnel to
support the maintenance of these critical apparatus.

TREATMENT FACILITY

• \$277M to build a new annex to the Correctional Treatment Facility (CTF).

POLICE

- \$2.1M and 18 additional staff to support civilianization efforts.
- \$1.4M for 6 staff and programming for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI), as well as employee wellness and wellbeing, to help retain officers.

PUBLIC SAFETY & JUSTICE

SAFER STREETS

- \$199M to redesign dangerous roadways and improve traffic safety.
- \$15M a year to deploy temporary and permanent traffic calming measures.

TRAILS

• \$148M for new or rehabilitated trail segments.

BIKING

• \$36M to continue building more protected bike lanes and \$15M to continue expansion of Capital Bikeshare.

BUS PRIORITY

• \$114M to continue building bus-only lanes and other bus priority treatments to make bus travel faster and more reliable.

ENVIRONMENTAL CLEANUP and WASTE REDUCTION

- \$3M to provide compost pickup for 9,000 homes served by DPW.
- \$24M for hazardous material remediation in the Anacostia River.

TRANSPORTATION & ENVIRONMENT

DISTRICT GOVERNMENT FACILITIES

- \$4.5M to expand HVAC preventative maintenance to non-DCPS facilities.
- \$6.9M in new dedicated funding to respond to maintenance requests at facilities, including public schools.

\$4.5M for a new one-stop web portal for resident services.

CYBERSECURITY

• \$4.2M to enhance cybersecurity protections through enhanced device security and proactive vulnerability remediation.

VOTER REGISTRATION

• \$567K for DMV to automatically register voters when the agency issues IDs to new residents.
