# FY 2020 Proposed Budget - Ward 8 Investments



#### **INVESTMENTS IN AFFORDABLE HOUSING**

- \$35M to grow the District's investment in affordable housing through the Housing Production Trust Fund (increased by \$30M to \$130M) and the Housing Preservation Fund (increased by \$5M to \$15M)
- \$20M for Workforce Housing to increase access to housing for teachers, first responders, social workers, hospitality workers, and others
- \$5.2M to expand and increase Schedule H, DC's income tax credit to help offset rising rents and mortgages



#### **INVESTMENTS IN EDUCATION & COMMUNITIES**

- **\$56.4M** increase in funding for DC Public Schools and Public Charter Schools, and 2.2% increase to the foundation level of the Uniform Per Student Funding Formula
- \$6M to expand school-based mental health services for students
- \$4.6M investment to provide a laptop or IT device for every student in grades 3, 6, and 9
- \$1.6M to open six new Full Service DCPS Community Schools across the District, including at Anacostia and Ballou
- \$250K in funding for teacher home visits through Families First schools in Wards 7 and 8
- \$16.2M to renovate the Congress Heights Recreation Center
- \$18.7M to renovate the Douglass Recreation Center
- \$57.6M for a full modernization of Garfield Elementary School
- \$23.3M for design and Year 1 construction at Green Elementary School
- \$13.5M to complete renovations at the Kramer Middle School Community Center
- \$13M for renovations at the Southeast Tennis and Learning Center



#### **INVESTMENTS IN PUBLIC SAFETY & TRANSPORTATION**

- \$3M toward expanding MPD officers to 4,000 by 2021, focusing on bikes and on-foot officers
- \$3.5M for four additional ambulances and 45 additional firefighters/paramedics/EMTs to serve Wards 7 and 8
- \$1.7M to open three physical offices in key neighborhoods where people can get clinical trauma-informed mental health support, including in Wards 7 and/or 8, and to train community leaders in trauma-informed action
- \$584K to expand violence prevention activities to four additional priority communities, including Congress Park and Parkland in Ward 8
- \$345K to increase outreach by community-based organization violence interrupters in Wards 7 and 8
- \$130K in additional funds to enhance violence prevention activities in Ward 8
- \$16.1M to launch the free DC Circulator and expand East of the River routes
- \$4.7M for hiring a new bike lane parking enforcement team, creating more pick-up and drop off zones, hosting
  open streets events and other improvements as part of Vision Zero
- \$240M investment in streetscapes, tree planting and urban forestry
- \$28.2M for local streets paving and maintenance
- \$6.2M for safety improvements along Alabama Ave SE
- \$26.6M for streetscape improvements along MLK Jr. Ave SE



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# **INVESTMENTS IN FAMILIES & SENIORS**

- \$4.5M to eliminate the Diaper Tax
- \$2.5M to make the "Keeping Childcare Affordable" Tax Credit permanent
- \$2M to increase funding for Safe at Home, enabling more seniors to age in place
- \$500K to provide grants for dental services to help seniors



#### **AND MORE**

- \$1.4M for new Office for East of the River Services with a mission to ensure that residents and neighborhoods in Ward 7 and Ward 8 enjoy the same socio-economic opportunities and benefits, high-quality District government facilities, community amenities, and access to District government services that all District residents and neighborhoods deserve
- \$3.8M to support installation of over 250 new free public WiFi access points to cover Ward 7 and 8 Great Streets and Main Streets by the end of FY 2021
- \$200K for Dream Grants to small businesses with fewer than five employees owned by Ward 7 and Ward 8
  residents
- \$1M to continue the District's path to statehood through education and engagement
- \$2.5M to ensure every resident is counted for Census 2020
- \$316.8M for a new hospital at Saint Elizabeth's
- \$90M for infrastructure at the redevelopment of the St Elizabeth's East campus
- \$9.8M for improvements at United Wellness Center
- \$11.4M for the Ward 8 Senior Wellness Center, delivering the project two years earlier than planned
- \$1M for a mobile, multi-disciplinary 24-hour response team that can provide crisis services to the residents of the District of Columbia
