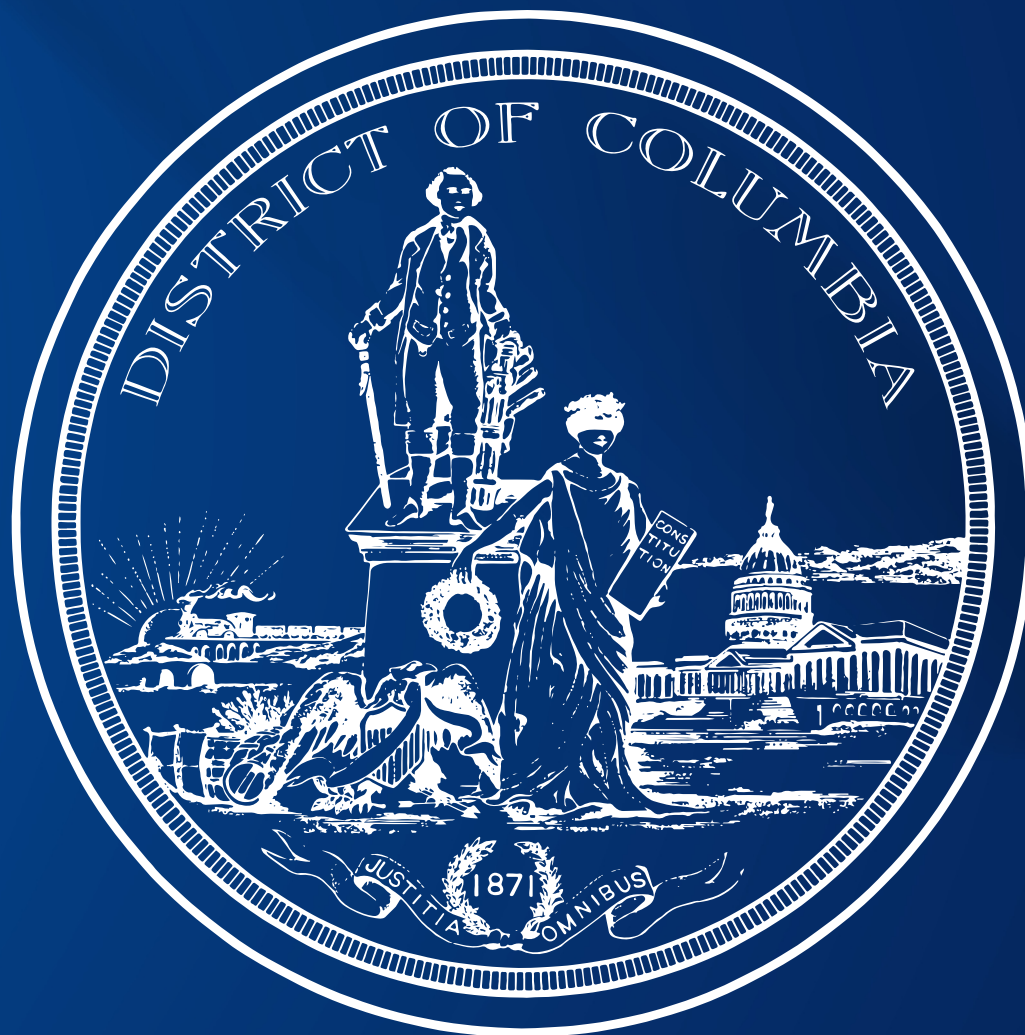

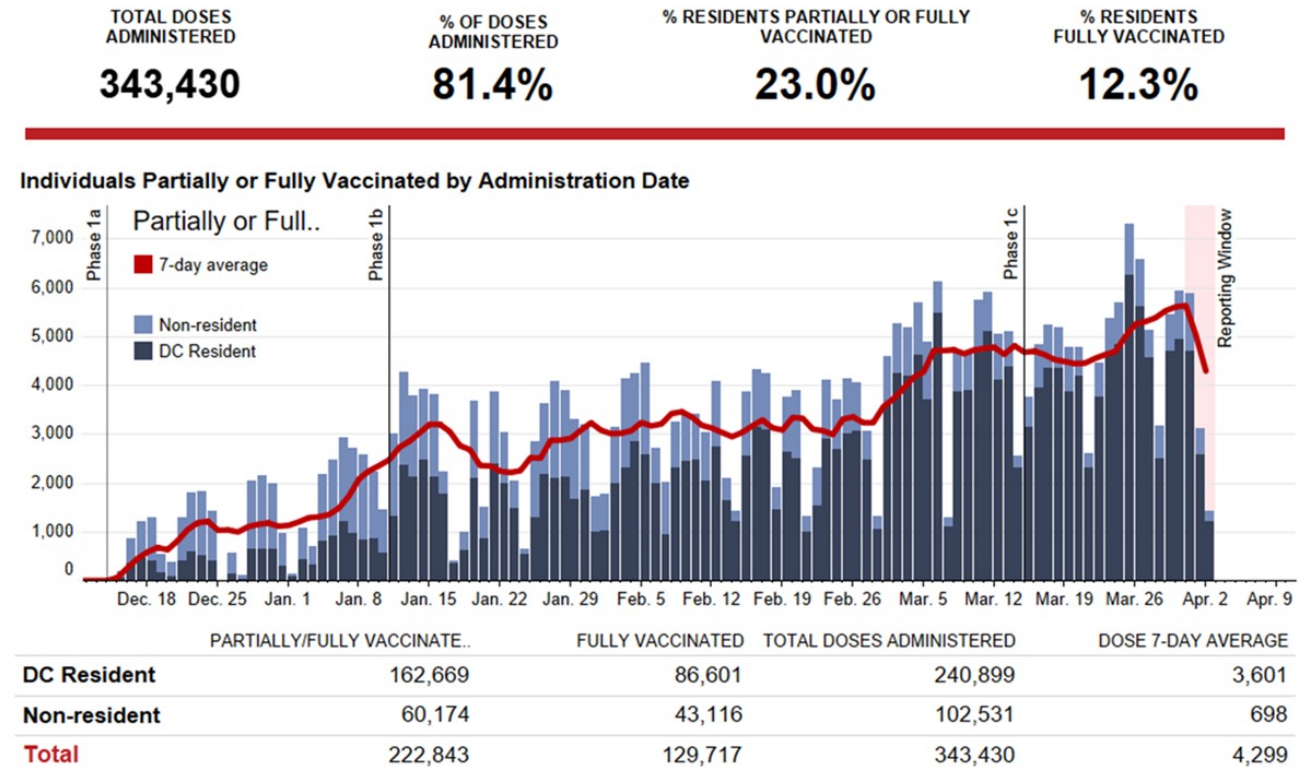

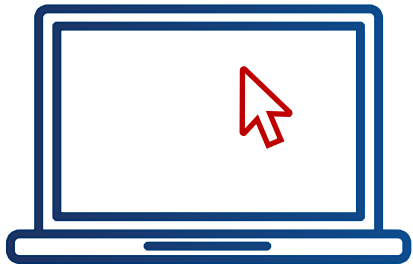
**Metric Definition:** Number of administrations reported by DC-area providers by date of vaccine administration. The 7-day rolling average represents the average number of administrations including the past 6 days.

**Data Considerations:** There may be a lag time between vaccine administration and provider report. This may impact the reporting of vaccine administered, especially in the three most recent days of report, highlighted in red above. DC residents may be vaccinated outside of the DC-area and are not included in this report. Non-DC residents may be vaccinated within DC, especially those who fall into prioritized non-resident categories. Administration may be impacted by holidays and weekends, and is impacted by the size of prioritized groups and vaccine supply. Individuals who receive single dose regimens such as J&J are considered fully vaccinated.

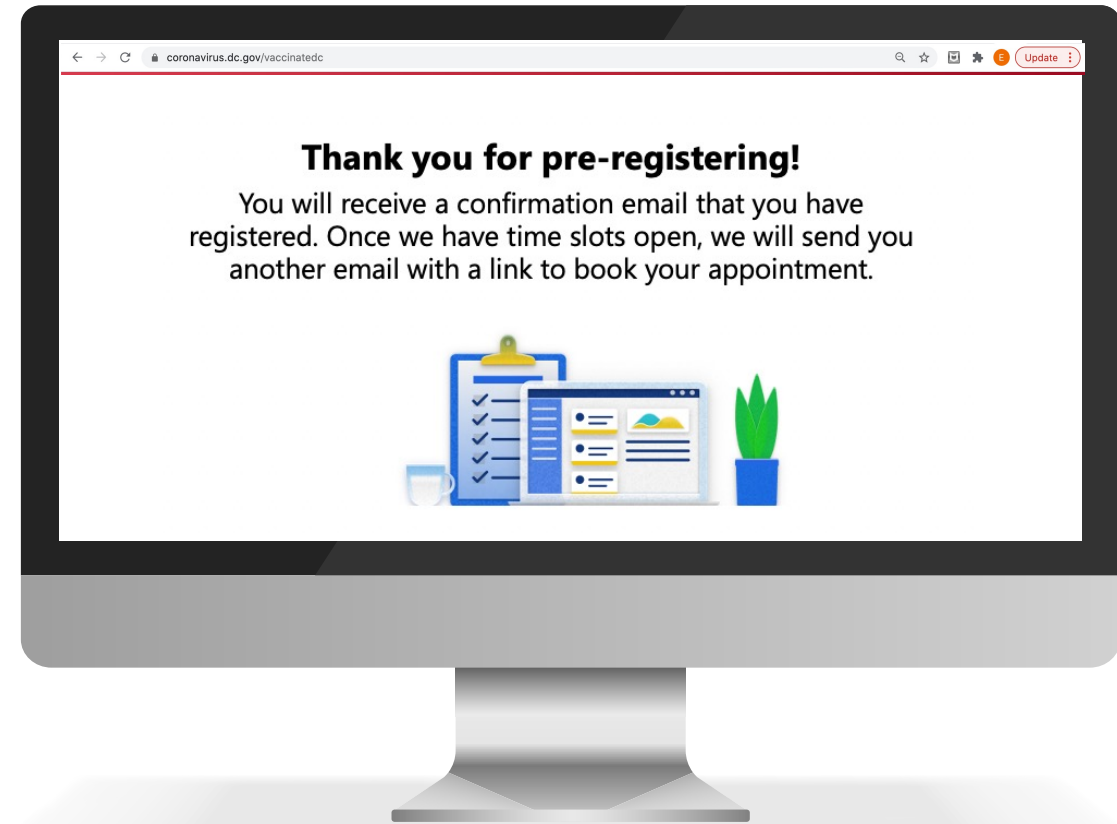

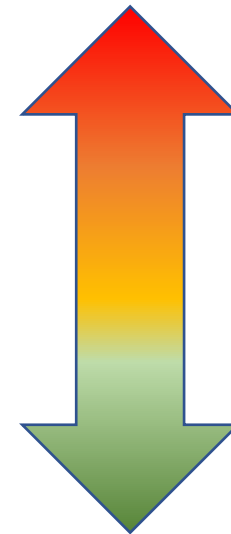

1. **MASKS** - Can and is the activity completed with or without wearing a mask?
2. **LOCATION** - Will the activity occur indoors, outdoors or a combination of both?
3. **LENGTH OF TIME** - How long will the person be engaged in the activity?
4. **DENSITY and SPACE** - How many people will be engaged based on the size of the space and what is the impact on maintaining social distance?
5. **BEHAVIOR and ACTIVITY** - What is the behavior and activity likely to occur when people are present?

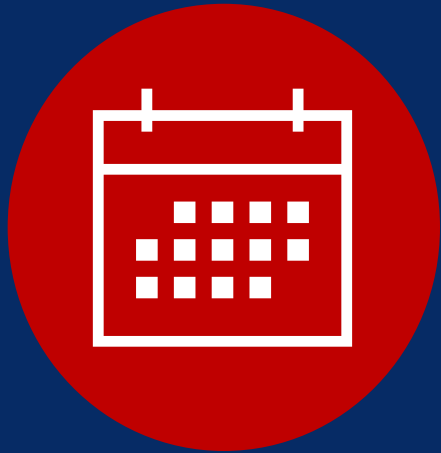
Unmasked, Indoors, Long Time, Very Dense



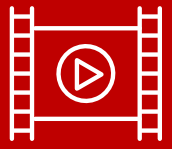
## Lowest Risk

# ENTERTAINMENT

**Seated live entertainment** (i.e. theater) will be allowed indoors and outdoors at 25% capacity (up to 500 people)



**Movie theaters** will be able to operate at 25% capacity



**Live music** will be allowed near outdoor restaurant seating







# CEREMONIES AND MEETINGS

13



**Weddings, special events, etc.** will be allowed indoors and outdoors at 25% capacity (with a waiver for attendance greater than 250)



**School graduations and awards ceremonies** will be allowed indoors and outdoors with capacity limits. Further guidance will be released this week



**Regional business meetings and seated conventions** will be allowed indoors and outdoors at 25% capacity (with a waiver for attendance greater than 250)





# FITNESS AND POOLS

- ✓ **Outdoor races** will be allowed at 50% capacity
- ✓ **Indoor and outdoor public pools** will be allowed to open at 50% capacity
- ✓ **Outdoor splash pads** will be allowed to open at full capacity





- ✓ **Recreation centers** will be able to operate indoors at 50% capacity
- ✓ **Libraries** will be able to operate at 50% capacity
- ✓ **Museums, galleries, and exhibits** will be able to operate at indoors and outdoors at 50% capacity
- ✓ **Non-essential retail** indoors and outdoors will be able to operate at 50% capacity
