DEPARTMENT OF BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

- **Prevention and Trauma Support:** Community and school-based prevention programs such as anger management, violence prevention, and anti-bullying, and trauma support for children and families.
- Juvenile Behavioral Diversion Program: Voluntary mental health treatment program in the DC Superior Court Juvenile Division for eligible youth 18 years old or younger instead of prosecution.
- **988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline:** Free telephone support by a trained crisis counselor, and onsite if needed. No enrollment.
- Emergency Mobile Crisis Support for adults, children and youth: Crisis and emotional support at home, in school, or the community. Call 1-888-793-4357
- Community Response Team: On the spot counseling, grief counseling, and community support in the aftermath of tragic events. Naloxone distribution. Call 202-673-6495
- **Joint MPD/DBH Training:** Mandatory Mental Health First Aid training for all officers and advanced Crisis Intervention Officer training.









OFFICE OF VICTIM SERVICES AND JUSTICE GRANTS

- Private Security Camera System Incentive Program: Encourages residents, businesses, non-profits and religious institutions to install security camera systems on their property and register them with the Metropolitan Police Department (MPD). This program is intended to help deter crime and assist law enforcement with investigations.
- DC Victim Hotline: Available 24/7 by telephone, text, or online chat, the DC Victim Hotline represents an unprecedented collaboration of service providers in DC who are working to seamlessly connect victims of crime to free resources and to help them navigate the physical, financial, legal, and emotional repercussions of crime.
- Address Confidentiality Program: Helps residents who fear for their safety by shielding their street address from public records, providing one tool in an individual's broader safety plan. Specifically, the program provides a legal substitute address for eligible DC residents to maintain the confidentiality of her or his actual address.

DC PUBLIC LIBRARY

Youth Engagement:

- Teen Council paid leadership opportunity for teens to assist staff and customers at their neighborhood library, develop programs, and provide community outreach.
- Credible Messengers partnership that brings youth advocates into libraries to help neighborhood teens transform attitudes and behaviors around violence.
- Peer Navigators: Library staff with lived experience of homelessness engage with library customers experiencing or at risk of homelessness, mental illness and/or substance use disorders to connect them with resources and support.

- Friends of the Library: Community members dedicated to improving their neighborhoods through programming and support of their local library. (www.dclibraryfriends.org)
- Meeting and Study Room Availability: Free spaces for hosting neighborhood meetings, providing space for students to study, neighbors to meet, and groups to collaborate and build community.
